Reflecting on the 2022 to 2023 fiscal year fills us with immense pride and excitement. Throughout this time, we made significant strides in strengthening our team and extending our impact at Feeding America Riverside | San Bernardino (FARSB).

We proudly welcomed new roles to the team in Development and Food Sourcing, enhancing our capacity to serve our neighbors in need. Moreover, our dedication to fostering talent led us to engage interns through a partnership with Riverside City College in vital areas such as Public Policy and Marketing, enriching our approach to addressing food insecurity.

In a testament to our commitment to empowering our community partners, we reinvested funds awarded to FARSB to bolster partner capabilities. This resulted in upgrades for our partners, such as enhanced refrigeration infrastructure and the acquisition of new refrigerated box trucks and transit vans to reach even more individuals with nutritious food.

Moreover, we sustained our gleaning initiative, fostering partnerships with communities throughout Riverside and San

Bernardino Counties. Our committed volunteers harvested fresh produce from various sources such as home gardens, citrus orchards, and local enterprises. By channeling these efforts into hunger relief programs, we ensured that nutritious, locally sourced fruits and vegetables reached families facing food insecurity, enriching their diets with healthy options.

A highlight of our year was our Nourishing the IE conference, where we brought together nearly 100 Community Partners for invaluable learning experiences. From volunteer management to succession planning and grant strategy, the conference provided a platform for innovation, reinforcing our collective mission to support neighbors in need throughout the counties we serve.

As we embark on the next chapter of our journey, let us carry forward the spirit of collaboration and empowerment that defines FARSB. Together, we will continue to make a difference in the lives of our neighbors, ensuring that no one goes hungry in the Inland Empire. Thank you for your support!

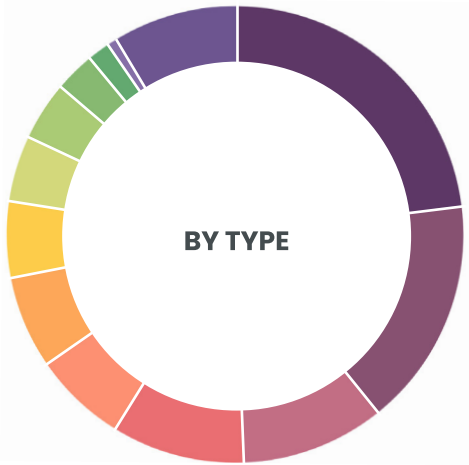

KITCHEN ARCHIVES: VOICES OF THE COMMUNITY

Distributions are vital to our food bank's operations, particularly during the holidays when many families rely on them to make ends meet. We've observed a concerning trend during these distributions: the soaring cost of living. Individuals and families who were once self-sufficient now turn to our food bank to provide for their households—the increasing cost of living forces families to make the difficult choice between paying bills and buying groceries. No one should have to grapple with this impossible decision. One such family facing these challenges is Stacy's. Recently, her husband was diagnosed with leukemia, adding further strain to their finances.

Despite her desire to provide nutritious meals for her family, the mounting grocery expenses have made this increasingly unattainable. Once within reach, healthy food options come at a higher cost—sometimes two to three times. According to the USDA, living costs in California are 41% higher than the national average, with grocery expenses escalating by 17%. At FARSB, we strive to ease this burden and provide assistance to families like Stacy's. Our distributions not only offer relief but also provide access to nutritious foods. Stacy expressed that our efforts “make it a lot easier on people like us to get healthy options.” The work we do can go a long way for our community.

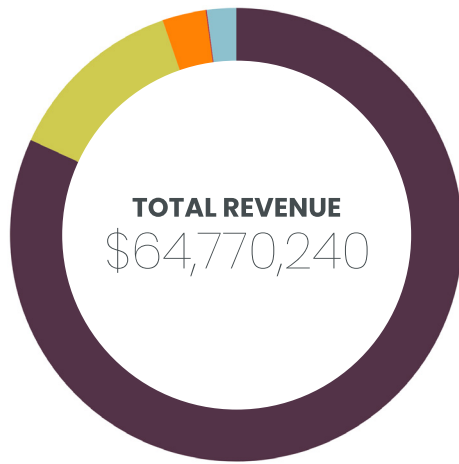

KITCHEN ARCHIVES: BROADENING HORIZONS

Our HERO program has undergone a rebranding to Nourish Now. We recruit volunteers to assist in delivering goods across San Bernardino and Riverside counties. Many of our neighbors encounter difficulties accessing grocery stores due to factors such as compromised immune systems, lack of transportation, or residing in rural food deserts. It's crucial for us to extend our reach to these families and individuals.

With the support of partners like Amazon and DoorDash, we're able to fulfill a portion of our deliveries. However, volunteers like Carol play a critical role in more remote areas.

As a remarkable gesture for her birthday, Carol chose to make nine deliveries throughout Riverside and San Bernardino counties. Her efforts were particularly impactful as these areas had been left without food or water following recent storms. Carol recounted a previous delivery where she stumbled upon a makeshift shelter housing six individuals in dire need of food. Without hesitation, she returned to our food bank to gather supplies, ensuring they had enough to weather the rainy nights ahead. Selfless acts like Carol's are what truly sustain our food bank, embodying the spirit of compassion and community that drives our mission forward.

A GIFT OF HOPE



Hope Lutheran Church of Riverside has served the community of Riverside for the past sixty years and counting. On Tuesday, November 15th, 2022, they donated 10% of the net proceeds from the sale of their property to FARSB, a longtime partner in our community outreach.

A small group of Hope Lutheran members and community volunteers, led by Larry Dodson and Carol Haffter, kept a weekly food pantry open during the pandemic and served approximately 50-60 families per week. When Hope Lutheran closed in March 2022, the congregation wanted to ensure that this necessary work would continue. "Providing outreach, services, meals, and groceries to the food insecure and homeless has always been integral to Hope Lutheran's mission," says Kathleen Bocian, a Hope Lutheran member.

Donations like these are the key to keeping our mission alive; with the support of everyone in the community, we can make a positive change and help others who do not have the means to afford nutritional food in their households.
