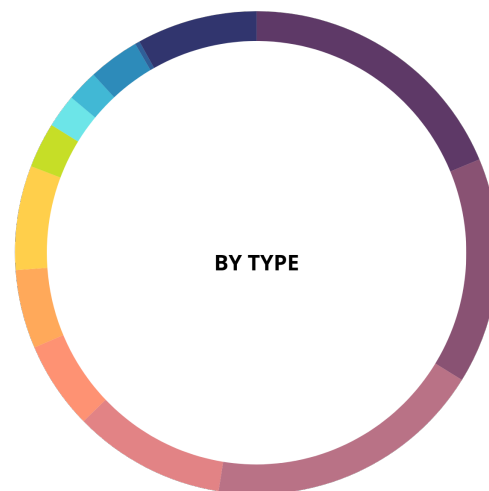

Looking Back at Our 45th Year



As FARSB marks the close of our 45th year of service, we're taking time to reflect on both the meaningful impact made and the growing need across the Inland Empire.

While progress has been achieved, this milestone also serves as a reminder that food insecurity remains a pressing challenge. Creating a more equitable food system requires continued collaboration, advocacy, and commitment from all of us.

That said, we are proud to celebrate the accomplishments of the past year. In calendar year 2025, FARSB:

- Opened our first client-choice pantry, the Fresh Start Pantry by Goodman, serving more than 1,000 households
- Served 22,179 students and children through our Grab N' Go program
- Partnered with military veteran-focused organizations through our MVP program to support 4,832 households
- Assisted community members with 1,372 successful CalFresh applications

From everyone at FARSB, thank you! None of this would be possible without the dedication of our donors, volunteers, community partners, and neighbors who stand with us.

KITCHEN ARCHIVES: COMMUNITY AT THE CENTER

This past year underscored just how essential food assistance programs are for families across the Inland Empire. As food costs continued to rise, thousands of households found themselves navigating unexpected gaps in support due to delays in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), also known as CalFresh in California.

For families already living paycheck to paycheck, even a short interruption in benefits can mean impossible choices between food, rent, utilities,

and healthcare. During the longest government shutdown in U.S. history, critical SNAP funding was temporarily withheld, leaving many families uncertain about when they would receive assistance.

FARSB saw firsthand how these delays intensified food insecurity across the region. Many of the neighbors we serve rely on SNAP to supplement their grocery budgets, and when benefits were delayed, the demand for emergency food assistance increased. Community leaders and members of Congress visited our Riverside warehouse during this time to emphasize the vital role SNAP plays and to advocate for families most impacted by these disruptions.

Throughout this period, FARSB remained committed to monitoring the situation, communicating updates, and ensuring food was available for neighbors when they needed it most. This year served as a powerful reminder that food assistance is not optional, but a necessity. SNAP and charitable food programs work best together, forming a critical safety net that protects families during times of crisis.

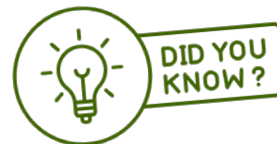
Thanks to the continued support of our partners, donors, volunteers, and advocates, FARSB was able to help fill the gap when federal systems faltered. As we look ahead, we remain steadfast in our mission to support policies that strengthen food access and to ensure every family in our community can count on nutritious food with dignity and stability.

In response, the Inland Empire community stepped up in extraordinary ways. Individual donors, corporate partners, foundations, and volunteers rallied together to ensure families did not go without food during this period of uncertainty. This outpouring of generosity strengthened our ability to meet the increased need, allowing FARSB to provide timely, nutritious food to neighbors while federal systems remained in flux.

Although the government has since reopened and benefits restored, the effects of the delays did not disappear overnight. Administrative backlogs and lingering uncertainty meant that many households continued to experience instability weeks after benefits were restored. FARSB will continue to work to provide nourishment and support for those who need it most.

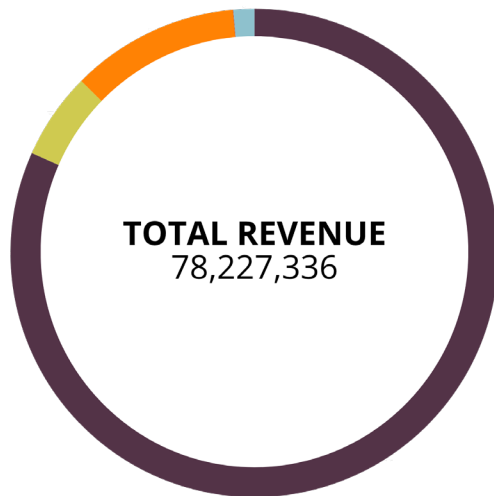

Feeding with Healthcare: Where Nourishment Meets Healing

Health begins long before a diagnosis and extends far beyond the walls of a hospital. For many families in the Inland Empire, access to nutritious food is one of the most critical components of overall well-being. Recognizing this connection, FARSB continues to strengthen partnerships that integrate food directly into healthcare settings.

Through our FoodRx program, healthcare providers connect patients experiencing food insecurity with nutritious food at the very place they receive care. By distributing food boxes at clinics, we remove barriers and reduce the stigma that can sometimes prevent individuals from seeking support.

This year, the FoodRx program served 7,379 patients across 4 healthcare sites, distributing more than 1,525 food boxes directly through clinical partnerships. Valerie Comeaux, FoodRx Partner at Riverside University Health System, shared the impact of this collaboration:

“We are happy to partner [FARSB] on with the FoodRx program. We want to continue to provide the service for our patients! The patients do not have any apprehension about receiving the boxes because they can pick up the boxes at their healthcare clinic instead of a food pantry. We hope there is an opportunity to expand the program to our other 12 RUHS – Community Health Centers and the Medical Center.”

Her perspective highlights a simple but powerful truth: food is healthcare. When patients have reliable access to nutritious food, they are better equipped to manage chronic conditions, reduce stress, and focus on long-term stability.

At the same time, healthcare-driven hunger relief must also address moments of personal crisis. Through our Fresh Start Pantry by Goodman, individuals and families facing sudden hardship can access food in a supportive, welcoming environment. The pantry serves as a bridge offering stability during times of uncertainty and ensuring that no one navigating financial strain or transition feels alone.

During the months of January to June in 2025, the Fresh Start Pantry provided 1,422 visits to individuals and families, distributing almost 149,000 pounds of food to neighbors facing urgent financial hardship. Krista Burkhardt, a Fresh Start Pantry recipient, described what that support meant during a difficult season:

“It is scary when you feel that you are one paycheck away from being on the street. Everyone [from the pantry] was friendly and helpful. It is hard to ask for help, but there was no judgment.”

Her words reflect what healthcare-aligned hunger relief is truly about: dignity. Whether through clinic-based food prescriptions or compassionate pantry services, this pillar represents our commitment to whole-person care. By addressing food insecurity as both a medical and social determinant of health, we are helping families regain stability, improve health outcomes, and move forward with confidence.

Cooking with Kianna



Each month, our Programs Team hosts a pantry cooking demonstration led by Kianna, a nutrition educator with our partners at the Riverside Free Clinic.

These demonstrations incorporate ingredients commonly found in our Fresh Start Pantry, showing community members how to turn pantry staples into simple, nutritious dishes at home.
